- **1984:** Start of organization known as Wildlife Rehabilitative and Research Cooperative 74 people at first organized meeting 1st official Board forms
- 1987: Obtained 501(c)3 status; 1st paid staff member employed
- **1988:** Treated nearly 1,300 animal patients
- **1991:** Ohio Wildlife Center moves to Animal Care Unlimited (current hospital location)
- 1999: Purchase of the 19.4 acre Cook Road property
- 2001: SCRAM! formed under the name Humane Wildlife Solutions
- **2002:** Hope the coyote was one of the first ambassadors exhibited at the Education Center
- **2005:** Dempsey Animal Building opens (1st permanent housing for animal ambassadors)
- **2008:** Waterfowl enclosure built and 202 animals transferred to the Pre-Release Facility
- **2012:** Songbird Aviary at Pre-release Facility opens
- **2016:** Bonner Barn open for programming
- **2017:** Wildlife Hospital treat 5,260 patients
- **2018:** The Bald Eagle enclosure opens at the Education Center
- **2019:** The new Naomi C. Dempsey Wildlife Clinic opens at the Pre-Release Facility
- **2019:** Ohio Wildlife Center celebrated 35 years of service to the community
- 2020: 8,105 patients treated at our Wildlife Hospital
- **2021:** SCRAM! Wildlife Control celebrates 20th anniversary
